- Specific media literacy content about topics like **judging media bias, fake news, social media**, and more.



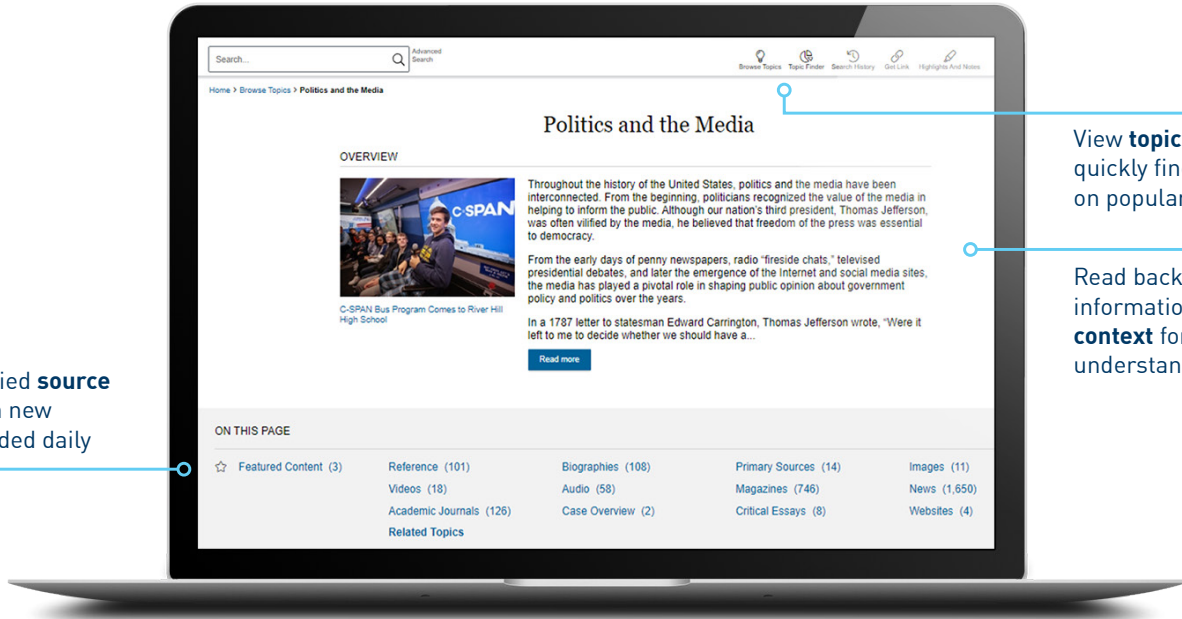
