Another man charged in £2,600,000 rail grab case

A NOTHER man was charged in connection with the Great Train Robbery last night-as Scotland Yard spread their biggestever dragnet for two men wanted tor questioning.

The man who was charged is turf accountant Charles Frederick Wilson, 31.

He is the seventh person to be accused in connection with the robbery.

Ambushed

Wilson, a six-footer, was ambushed by two Flying Squad detectives when he walked into a house in Crescent-lane, Clapham, yesterday.

He was driven to Aylesbury, Bucks-where the police investigating the robbery have

their headquarters. Wilson was charged with being con-cerned in robbing Frank Dewhurst of £2,631,784, the property of the Postmaster

Frank Dewhurst is an official who was in the Travelling Post Office when it was ambushed at Sears Crossing, Bucks, two weeks ago.

Today Wilson will appear at Linslade court, four miles from the scene of the

Before Wilson was arrested yesterday. his photograph and those of two other men were

issued by the Yard. The other men are Bruce Richard Reynolds, 41, a motor and antique dealer, of Lonsdale - avenue, East Ham, and another Londoner, cafe proprietor James E. White, 43.
