

State Papers Online Part III The Stuarts: James I to Anne, 1603-1714: State Papers Domestic

State Papers Online, 1509-1714, is a groundbreaking new online resource for the study of Early Modern Britain and Europe. Spanning two centuries of the British monarchy the collection reunites State Papers Domestic and Foreign with the Registers of the Privy Council in The National Archives, Kew. This unique online resource reproduces the original historical manuscripts in facsimile and links each manuscript to its corresponding fully-searchable Calendar entry. By overcoming the challenge of matching an individual Calendar entry to the original Paper, *State Papers Online* signifies an enormous advance for scholars researching and teaching 16th and 17th century politics, society, and economic and religious history.

Owing to the size of the collection - almost 2.2 million pages in total - *State Papers Online* is published in four parts. Parts I and II, combined, cover the complete State Papers for the whole of the Tudor period. Part III consists of the State Papers Domestic for the Stuart era and Part IV contains State Papers Foreign, Ireland and Registers of the Privy Council, completing the collection for the whole of the Stuart period.

State Papers Online Part III: The Stuarts: James I to Anne, 1603-1714 State Papers Domestic

Under the general editorship of Professor John Miller from Queen Mary, University of London, *State Papers Online, Part III* uncovers a fascinating portrait of Stuart Britain. Documenting one of the most compelling and turbulent eras in Britain's social, political and religious history, the era's internal struggles come to life through a wealth of primary source documents including: royal and diplomatic correspondence, reports and parliamentary drafts from civil servants and provincial administrators. Included among its almost 1 million pages scholars will find accounts of the English Civil War, the execution of Charles I, the subsequent rise of Cromwell, the Restoration of Charles II and the invasion of William of Orange. As well as providing detailed accounts of daily life and events across all strata of society, the collection uncovers the numerous incidents

in Stuart Britain of conspiracy, espionage, treason, heresy, imprisonment and execution. *State Papers Online, Part III* offers fertile ground for new shoots of research and teaching in 17th century politics, government, social economic and religious history.
